Battle of Horseshoe Bend National U.S. Military Park & The Muskogees

- Creek Civil War: 1813-1814
- Establishment of Park in 1959 by President Roosevelt
- Grand Opening to the Public in 1964 during Civil Rights Era
- Collaboration between National Park Service and Muskogee tribal members
- Replacement of old narratives with ones that are more authentic representations of Muskogee history and culture
- Collaboration with Ho-Chunk tribal members to create signage


